LOCAL PREPAREDNESS FOR TERRORISM AND DISASTER U.S. and Israeli Perspectives

Terrorism remains a global threat as evidenced by events in the Middle East, Europe, and beyond. The shootings in Fort Hood, Texas, in November 2009, were the largest terrorist attack on United States soil since 9/11. Elsewhere in the U.S., including in New Jersey, several planned attacks have failed or been thwarted. The continuing threat requires responsible awareness and preparation by both professionals and the general citizenry. Moreover, such preparation could be applicable to accidental or naturally caused disasters as well.

The purpose of the activity is to familiarize attendees with methods of response to terrorist or disaster events and provide a brief overview of the new field of terror medicine. The activity will bring together experts from New Jersey and Israel to discuss the status of current threats and address the distinctive characteristics of terror medicine specific to local preparedness and response. Many healthcare professionals are unfamiliar with their roles related to local responses to terrorist or disaster events specifically in the context of terror medicine.

Any individual could find him or herself at the scene of a terror or disaster event. With advanced preparation, any individual could be in a position to provide assistance to family members and other victims. Accordingly, this activity is designed not only for professional responders, but for trained volunteers and others in the general public.

- Discuss the integrated relationship that healthcare professionals should have with onsite volunteers to assist them in case of a terrorist or disaster event.
- Describe how healthcare professionals can effectively manage and utilize on-the-scene bystanders or survivors during and after a terrorist or disaster event.
